The 75th Anniversary kicked-off with an assembly in the gym. Joining our festivities, face-to-face and virtually, were students, alumni, staff, board members, donors, and friends. Executive Director Mark Eads spoke about the history of our school, Mrs. White's perseverance to open the doors, and how the real rock-stars of the last 75

years have been and will always be our students. Mr. Eads stated that Mrs. White's legacy will continue to lead us into the next 75 years.

Sunshine Cottage has shared an incredible history with the families and children who have come through our program, and we are extremely excited to see what the future has in store.

In the Beginning

Mrs. Spencer Tracy of the John Tracy Clinic encourages Mrs. White to open a school in San Antonio for children with hearing loss.

1947

The Junior League of San Antonio is instrumental in the opening of the school. They awarded a \$15,000 donation over three years to establish

a pilot program for children with hearing loss.

A caretaker's cottage on the Landa Library property is donated to be used as a schoolhouse. A local hardware store gifts yellow paint for the school, which is how "Sunshine" was integrated into the name of the school.



June 16, 1947

Sunshine Cottage School for Deaf Children is founded by Mr. and Mrs. John H. White, Sr. The school opens as a summer school and begins with six students and one summer-school teacher, Miss Van Wyk.

A life-changing opportunity is now available to children who are deaf or hard of hearing.

A seventh student was enrolled the next semester.

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Message from the Executive Director



Today we reminisce about our 75 years as a community, the 75 years of helping children, and the why and how it all began - a mother's love for her child. This love has been evident with every parent who walks through our doors in the hope that his/her child live and flourish in a hearing world. Each family's journey is different, but the love and dedication for each child's success is unwavering.

We are fortunate to have records of parents' writings from 1950, and as I looked back at the first Parent Newsletter, I realized that what parents did and how they felt for their children then is identical to

how our parents think and what they do today. One Sunshine Cottage parent, Whitney Weaver, found that having a child who is deaf provides her opportunities to grow. She said it best when she wrote the following in a 2018 Alamo City Moms blog.

"Listening for the happiness in every circumstance. It's bold to say that we can choose happiness in every circumstance, and one year ago I would have dismissed that idea. It's amazing to me, though, that two people can see the same circumstance so differently. Our thoughts tell us what to listen for, and whatever we listen for, we find. So why not listen for happiness?

Listening for opportunities, not limitations. At first, I viewed the act of putting on my son's hearing technology as a limitation. Typing that makes me cringe now because that technology is an incredible opportunity. Consider the fact that of the 11 million people in the world who may benefit from a cochlear implant, only 400,000 have them. Consider that not everyone has health insurance that will cover cochlear implant procedures or hearing aids. Consider that of all the places on the planet, our family was led to San Antonio,



Texas, where there is a phenomenal school for children who are deaf and hard-of-hearing. Opportunities. Now I gladly rush to put on his hearing technology so that when we snuggle he hears the "I love you's" and the songs and the giggles.

Being still and just listening. We all need pause and stillness to reconnect with ourselves. Once I allowed that I was able to contribute so much more as a mother and in all aspects of my life."



1953

King Antonio XXXI, Mr. John A. Bitter, Jr., a member of the Sunshine Cottage Board of Directors, and his royal entourage visit Sunshine Cottage.

King Antonio visited Sunshine Cottage for the first time in 1952.

1954

Sunshine Cottage and Trinity University proposed a teacher training program. *Feb. 1954 Newsletter, Vol. IV, No.5 states:* "We have now reached the point where our program should be expanded in a way that will not only improve our school, but would also insure the future of Sunshine Cottage."

Marks the beginning of the eighth school year with 53 students and seven teachers.

Sunshine Cottage provides hearing tests as a service to the San Antonio public schools.

1955

The first sound proof classroom is installed. More classrooms are planned to follow. The room has acoustic tiling on the walls, carpeting on the floor, and suspended ceiling microphones. New desks have front fittings for earphones. Funding for the classroom was provided by Myra Stafford Pryor Fund.



1956

Sunshine Cottage is governed by a community Board made up of educators, doctors, clergy, and philanthropic citizens.

1958

Sunshine Cottage is accredited as a private elementary school by the Texas Education Agency.

1957

Sunshine Cottage celebrates it's tenth anniversary. Mrs. Spencer Tracy is the guest of honor. Mrs. Tracy is the founder of the John Tracy Clinic in Los Angeles.

Sunshine Cottage May 1957 Newsletter Vol. III, No. 9 The original Sunshine Cottage class of students are integrated into Robert E. Lee Junior High School. Three members comprise the class, Tuleta White, Tom Lewis, and Wally Mallay. Mrs. Dorothy Duffy is assigned as their on campus teacher. This is the first time that a class, as an entire group, has been able to enter a hearing school in the public school system. Sunshine Cottage 1958 Newsletter, Vol. V. No. I

The addition to the Sunshine Cottage building is completed. The 7,000 square-foot addition to the building adds six new classrooms and a library. Suspended from the ceilings are new movable microphone cords. Headphones are now able to be plugged into the floor outlets.

1959

The Charity Ball Association presents Sunshine Cottage with a \$10,000 gift. Sunshine Cottage has been named as a Charity Ball beneficiary for the last four-out-of-five years.

Sunshine Cottage appoints Dr. Rachel Davies new director of the school.

The joint teacher training program between Sunshine Cottage and Trinity University's Education Department begins. Dr. Rachel Davies serves as the program head. The first students enrolled in the program are Joan Utley, Annelle Lykins, and Mrs. Madeline Wilder.
